PREFACE

Believing it to be the duty of each generation to authenticate, preserve, add to, and pass on; for the sake of generations to come, known facts of family history and lineage; I have had the following data compiled relating to the Moroney Family, commencing with my grandparents, Jacobus (James) and Ann O'Connell McCarthy Moroney.

The derivation of the name "Moroney" is related in the two volume work, "Irish Pedigrees", by John O'Hart, published by Murphy and McCarthy, New York, 1923; page 240, volume 1, as quoted:

"O'Moroney: This family name is one of the anglicized forms of spelling the Irish name O'Maolruanaidh, which is derived from Maolruanaidh (or Mulroona) Mor, a younger brother of Conchobar (or Connor) who is No. 106 on the O'Connor (Kings of Connaught) Pedigree.

"Other forms of this spelling were: O'Mulrooney, O'OMulroney, O'Moroney, Moroney, Moroni, etc. According to O'Dugan's Topography O'Maolruanaidh was one of three chieftains of Crumthan, a district comprising the barony of Killian and part of Ballmoe, in the County Galway. The O'Moroney portion of the family more lately settled in County Clare, where many still remain, and whence some of the family emigrated to America some 120 years ago, and others more lately. Descendants are settled in North Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, and Louisiana, among them Timothy Moroney of New Orleans."

This work traces the lineage of six generations of Moroneys, beginning with Jacobus, or James, as he was called after arrival in America, down to the great grand children of the undersigned.

The information set forth in the following pages does not attempt to include all the descendants of Jacobus and Ann; it does include all the known facts about the second and third generations, and all the data of six generations in the line of James Moroney, second son of Jacobus and Ann. I am indebted to various members of the Moroney and allied families in Texas and elsewhere for furnishing data not previously included in the records here, and to my brother, Colonel Thomas Joseph Moroney, for his assistance in working with the professional genealogist.



On page 9, in the first paragraph, Mrs. William Joseph Moroney (Lelia Rodgers) was born in Grand Saline, Texas and the family moved to Texarkana several years later.

CERTAIN DESCENDANTS OF JACOBUS MORONEY

I Jacobus Moroney, ancestor of several generations of Moroneys in Texas and other states in the U. S., was born in Ennis, County Clare, Ireland, 5 August 1813. He came to the United States in 1849, arriving at New York, settling in Massachusetts, moving to Ohio, and then to Richland Center, Wisconsin. He died in Dallas, Texas, 15 April 1891. In America he used the anglicized form of the name Jacobus, which is James, and is so referred to in the pages following.

He married 20 January 1839, at Six Mile Bridge, County Clare, (six miles from the city of Limerick) Ann, daughter of Charles and Ann O'Connell McCarthy. The marriage certificate, copy of which is in possession of the family in Dallas, Texas, shows the witnesses as Curl McCarthy and Maurice O'Connell.

Ann O'Connell was a cousin of Daniel O'Connell, Member of Parliament (1838), Lord Mayor of Dublin, a national hero of Ireland, known as "The Great Irish Liberator".

James' wife, Ann, arrived in the U. S. in 1850.

James and Ann McCarthy Moroney had six children, three sons, and three daughters:

- II Timothy Moroney, born in Ireland, 1845
- II Maria Moroney, born in Ireland, 1847
- II James Moroney, born in Ireland, 1850
- II Elizabeth Moroney, born in U. S., 1853
- II Sarah Moroney, born in U. S., 1855
- II William Joseph Moroney, born in U. S., 1859

All of these children married in the United States: detailed information shown on the following pages.

Ann McCarthy, who married Jacobus Moroney at Six Mile Bridge in 1839, was the daughter of Charles and Ann O'Connell McCarthy, as stated earlier. According to family history, Ann O'Connell was "a cousin" of Daniel O'Connell, 1775-1847, "The Great Irish Liberator."

Family records do not show the exact relationship between Ann O'Connell and Daniel O'Connell; whether their fathers were brothers, or their grandfathers were, or even more remote ancestors were of the same immediate family, we do not know. Inquiry in Ireland has been unsuccessful to date.

We cannot, therefore, set down the exact lineage of Ann O'Connell, but for the record we are quoting a portion of the lineage as it is given by John O'Hart, in his work "Irish Pedigrees," published by Murphy and McCarthy, New York City, 1923. In Vol. 1, page 184:

"1. Aodh O'Connell of the race of Daire Cearb, and descended from Conall ("conall;" Irish, friendship) son of Fionnliath, m. Margaret, daughter of Maithan Maonmaighe O'Brien, Prince of Thomond, by whom he had issue.

"2. Geoffrey, his son, lived in 1370, m. Catherine, daughter of O'Connor-Kerry.

"3. Donal, his son, m. Honoria, daughter of O'Sullivan Bere.

"4. Aodh, his son, was knighted by Sir Richard Nugent, then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. He m. Mary, a daughter of Donal MacCarthy Mor (No. 116 on the MacCarthy Mor stem.)

"5. Maurice, his son, m. Juliana, daughter of Rory O'Sullivan Mor. This Maurice declared for Perkin Warbeck, but obtained pardon from the English king, through the influence of the MacCarthy Mor, on the 24th of August, 1496.

"6. Morgan, his son, m. Elizabeth, daughter of O'Donovan, Lord of Clan-Cathail, in Carberry.

"7. Aodh, his son, m. Mora, daughter of Sir Teige O'Brien, of Belle-na-Carriga, in Clare.

"8. Morgan, his son, called "of Ballycarberry," was high sheriff of the county of Kerry, he m. Elana, daughter of Donal McCarthy.

"9. Richard, his son, m. Johanna, daughter of Ceallaghan MacCarthy, of Carrignamult, in the county of Cork. This Richard assisted Queen Elizabeth's generals against the Great Geraldine, surrendered his estates, and obtained a re-grant through the influence of the lord deputy.

"10. Maurice, his son, was High Sheriff of Kerry, he m. Margaret, daughter of Conchobhar O'Callaghan, of Clonmeen, in the county of Cork.

"11. Geoffrey, his son, High Sheriff of Kerry, m. Honoria, daughter of The MacCrohan, of Lettercastle.

"12. Daniel, of Aghagabhar, son of Geoffrey, m. Alice, daughter of Christopher Segrave, of Cabra, in the county of Dublin.

"13. John, of Aghagower and Derrynane, his son, m. Elizabeth, daughter of Christopher Conway, of Cloghane, in the county of Kerry.

"14. Daniel, his son, m. Mary, daughter of Dubh O'Donoghue, of Amoys, in the county of Kerry.

"15. Morgan, of Cahireen, in the barony of Ivergah, his son, m. Catherine, daughter of John O'Mullane, of Whitechurch, by whom he had issue: 1. Daniel; 2. James, of Tralee; and 3. Ellen, who m. D. O'Connell of Tralee.

"16. Daniel, his son, styled "The Liberator," who was M. P. and also Lord Mayor of Dublin. He married his cousin, Mary O'Connell, by whom he had issue: Morgan, Maurice, John, and Daniel.

"This Daniel (No. 16 above) was born in 1775, and died at Genoa, on the 15th of May, 1847; his heart was sent to Rome, and his body interred in the Prospect Cemetery, Glassnevin, Dublin, where a round tower of Lucan granit, 173 feet high, surmounted by a granite cross 7 feet in height, has been erected to his memory. A splendid statue of "The Liberator" in O'Connell Street, Dublin, forms one of the chief attractions of one of the grandest streets in Europe.

"17. Morgan, the eldest son of The Liberator, had three brothers, Maurice, John, and Daniel, and three daughters, Ellen, Catherine, and Elizabeth."

Which of the above ancestors of Daniel O'Connell, "The Liberator," was also a direct ancestor of Ann O'Connell who married Charles McCarthy, and whose daughter Ann McCarthy married Jacobus Moroney, is not known to us here; we note that the certified copy of the marriage certificate of Jacobus and Ann McCarthy Moroney, which we received recently from Six Mile Bridge, County Clare, Ireland, shows that one of the two witnesses was Maurice O'Connell, and that the name Maurice appears more than once in the above line, including among the sons of "The Liberator."

Mrs. Ann Moroney Had Lived
Here Many Years

Mrs. Ann Moroney died yesterday at 4:07 in the afternoon at the residence of her son, James Moroney, 237 McKinney Avenue. She had been confined to her bed about ten days. She died from general debility arising from extreme old age.

Mrs. Moroney was born at Six Mile Bridge, County Clare, Ireland, six miles from the city of Limerick, on April 8, 1821, and was thus in her eighty-third year at the time of her death. Her father was Charles McCarthy. Her mother was Ann O'Connell, a cousin of Daniel O'Connell, the great "Irish Liberator", perhaps the most eminent patriot and statesman Ireland has produced. At the age of seventeen she married James Moroney, who came to New York in 1849.

Mrs. Moroney and her three children, Timothy, Maria and James, followed in 1850, the oldest son, John, having died a few days before her departure from Ireland. They first settled in Massachusetts, then in Ohio, and finally in Richland County, Wisconsin, then almost a wilderness. The family resided on a farm in Wisconsin until 1882, when they moved to Dallas. Here her husband, James Moroney, died thirteen years ago, at the age of seventy-eight. He is buried in Calvary cemetery, where Mrs. Moroney will be laid beside him tomorrow.

Mr. and Mrs. Moroney had ten children, of whom five survive; Timothy Moroney, now of Monroe County, Tennessee; James Moroney; W. J. Moroney; Mrs. M. A. Walsh and Mrs. E. A. Dunn, all of Dallas.

Mrs. Moroney was a woman of very strong and intellectual character. Her one great ambition in life was to give her children a good education and make them useful citizens. For this purpose she considered no sacrifice too great, and all of her inexhaustible energy was devoted to her children until they were able to care for themselves. In her old age she was a great reader, and to the last took a lively interest in all important current events, and was exceptionally well informed. It was observed by her family and friends that as her body became feeble, her mind appeared to grow more clear and serene. It never failed or wandered until she fell into her last sleep.

She was always a devoted member of the Catholic Church, and had that faith which was unclouded by a single doubt. She was broad and charitable in her views, and many of her most intimate friends were members of other religious denominations. Without any ostentation, she was devoted to religious and charitable work, and her sympathy, counsel and assistance will be missed by many. DEATH OF MRS. MORONEY

Mother of James Moroney and W. J. Moroney Dies at Her Home at the Age of 83.

After an illness lasting ten days, Mrs. Ann Moroney, aged 83 years, died yesterday at 221 McIlhenny avenue, the home of her son, James Moroney. The cause of her death was general debility, arising from extreme old age, but for the past ten days she had been confined to her bed. Within a month unclouded to the last minute, she passed away at 4:07 o'clock yesterday.

Mrs. Moroney was born in County Clare, Ireland, April 8, 1821. Her father was Charles McCarthy, and her mother was Ann O'Connell. At the age of 17 she married James Moroney.

In 1849 Mr. Moroney moved to Massachusetts, where he lived two years. Two more years were spent in Ohio, whence Mr. Moroney and family moved to Richland County, Wisconsin. There they remained until 1882, when Mr. Moroney decided to come to Dallas.

Mr. Moroney died twelve years ago at the age of 78 years. The birth and years Moroney were born ten children. Five of them are now living: Timothy of Monroe County, Tennessee; James Moroney, W. J. Moroney, and Mrs. M. A. Walsh and Mrs. E. A. Dunn, all of Dallas.

Mrs. Moroney was a woman of strong character and intellectuality. Her mind was clear to the last. She was deeply interested in charitable work of all kinds, devoting almost all her time for a number of years past to ameliorating the condition of those in distress.

Mrs. Moroney was a devout Catholic, and her funeral, which will take place at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning, will be held from Sacred Heart Cathedral.

II James Moroney, third child of James and Ann McCarthy Moroney, as previously mentioned, on page 6, was born in County Clare, Ireland, 19 May 1850, and died in Dallas, Texas, 2 September 1910.

He came to the United States, with his mother, in 1850, his father having preceded them in 1849. He moved to Dallas in 1875, where he founded, the same year, the Moroney Hardware Company, dealers in heavy hardware, both wholesale and retail. This company prospered, and was one of the leading mercantile establishments in Dallas for over fifty years.

He married, 6 June 1887, at Bryan, Texas, Lenora (Nonie) Bush McQueen, who was born 7 July 1864, at Washington-on-the-Brazos, Texas, and died, 18 May 1899, in Dallas, Texas. She was the daughter of Major Thomas J. McQueen, who was born in the Charleston District of South Carolina 25 May 1825, and died 12 August 1884. He married, in 1856, at Gainesville, Alabama, Mary Louise Bush, born 1827, died 30 October 1865, at Bryan, Texas.
